ARHAUS FURNITURE

Leawood, Kansas



Approximately 10 miles south of Kansas City in Leawood is home to the new, two-story Arhaus Furniture store, which was beautifully designed and built from the ground-up and occupies more than 18,000 square feet. This is the first ground-up construction for Arhaus, and the building includes state-of-the-art energy management controls for lighting and mechanical systems.



The building architecture incorporates a unique combination of brick, granite and glass on the exterior, with reclaimed oak flooring inside to provide a contemporary, cutting-edge industrial design.

The spectacular design features within the building includes an expansive amount of brick and stone wall accents, a custom iron staircase wrapping the free-standing elevator tower, which leads to a 30 foot atrium on the second floor, and a three-season outdoor patio, complete with custom gates, fountains and an Indonesian jugla hut made from hand-carved teak.

REVITALIZING THE POLO CLUB FITNESS CENTER



Designed to meet the needs of its residents, the Polo Club Apartments in Strongsville, Ohio engaged RDL to reimagine and transform an outdated racquetball court into a new, modern fitness center. In order to create an efficient use of space, a smaller exercise room across the hall was also updated with our design to provide a larger, more unified exercise facility, with

common materials in each room.

Key elements of the space include recycling and repositioning windows to allow natural light to shine in. Other architectural enhancements were emphasized in the variation of textures and paints, fixtures and lighting, window treatments, varying ceiling heights and spatial relationships between the different pieces of equipment.
